Forget Edison and Marconi, meet... Nikola Tesla

Nikola Tesla left his home country, now known as Croatia, at the end of the 19th century. Tesla had been working with Thomas Edison in Paris and so impressed him with his work Edison lured Tesla to America to work for him there.

He also cast doubts on Tesla's sanity because Tesla was quite open about the fact that his theories came to him in visions and hallucinations.

"Like a flash of lightning and in an instant the truth was revealed. I drew with a stick on the sand the diagrams of my motor."

Westinghouse sided with Tesla and his more efficient alternating current technology but set Tesla a daunting task.

The Chicago Expo of 1893 was being held and Westinghouse wanted something to make a big impact on the show.

Using Tesla's alternating current motors, they were able to show transferable electricity to the world on a massive scale.

Tesla was on his way to becoming a success, but Edison had ideas about that.

Electricity was an unknown in those days, so to shock the world Edison pulled a callous stunt, Edison electrocuted Topsy, an elephant, in public.

"If Edison had a needle to find in a haystack, he would proceed at once with the diligence of a bee to examine straw after straw until he found the object of his search. I was a sorry witness of such doings, knowing that a little theory and calculation would have saved him ninety per cent of his labour."... Nikola Tesla

With over 200 patents to his name,

Tesla was well on his way to transmitting electric power without wires, when he ran into trouble with J.P. Morgan, a financial interest, in 1901.

Tesla had devised an ambitious project to magnify and transmit power to ships at sea and eventually to provide free electricity for the whole world using a device known as the Tesla coil.

With this discovery Tesla realized that free energy to the world was a possibility and would benefit mankind.

One like-minded individual was the author and great thinker Mark Twain who spent many hours with Tesla learning and witnessing his amazing discoveries.

Twain backed up and supported Tesla's revolutionary ideas and worked together with him in helping humanity with whatever skills they had to offer.

These new discoveries raised the interest in J. P. Morgan, financier and banker.

Morgan believed that wireless communication was the way of the future and offered Tesla \$150,000 to build a tower that could transmit the first wireless transatlantic message.

Tesla agreed and began work on his Wardenclyffe tower.

Unknown to Morgan, Wardenclyffe Tower was also one giant Tesla Coil, a structure that Tesla thought would provide free electrical power to possibly the entire world.

Morgan was tracking the high costs involved in the building of the tower, which was only to transfer wireless messages, and forced Tesla to admit that the tower was also a device to transfer free energy.

Morgan told Tesla that he was withdrawing funding on the tower because, "You can't put a meter on the air."

Morgan ordered Wardenclyffe Tower destroyed, free energy was a threat to his profit margin.

Marconi eventually received credit for the first successful wireless transmission, to which Tesla said, "Let him continue his work. After all he is using seven of my patents."

After Tesla's funding was withdrawn by Morgan, he was ruined, forced into obscurity, and left penniless.

But he continued to develop his theories and ideas, knowing they would never be put to use.

He spent his final years living in a hotel room in New York City.

Nikola Tesla always maintained that the
